

THE INTERNET IS AT RISK: CONTACT YOUR SENATOR

Imagine trying to get online but only having access to the websites and apps that AT&T, Verizon or Comcast allow you to see. If these companies get their way, the Internet as we know it will cease to exist. It will start looking more like cable TV — with tiered plans and a limited menu of content available. **The answer to this threat? Net Neutrality.**

As corporations seek to control what we do online, we need strong, common sense rules to ensure that the Internet remains open. We need minimal but effective oversight to protect Internet users and their freedom to access the websites and services of their choice.

Net Neutrality rules and the Internet as we know it are at risk, and we need your help.

This summer, the Senate will vote on what's called a "resolution of disapproval" — a measure that could strip the Federal Communications Commission, the agency that protects the public from abuses of power by media companies, of its ability to protect Internet users. While it adopted *some* rules to preserve your online freedom, Internet companies watered those rules down. If this resolution passes, *any* hope for strong Net Neutrality protections will disappear.
